
































The 12 novels chosen for the longlist were selected from an abundance of submissions. They include beloved and best-selling novelists, with impressive back catalogues, as well as fantastic debut witty writers and rising stars.

The twelve books embrace a rich and varied backdrop of witty content. We travel between wartime to Britain, to 19th century Russia as well as Yorkshire while discovering the secret lives of Punjabi widows. We also see how mothers cope in the face of modern challenges but in very different ways. We explore the difficulties of finding true love in real life set in a world of online disappointment (or even just a date for the wedding where the ex will be). 












From over 200 submissions, 12 fantastic funny stories were chosen.
